

YEAR 6


This week Year 6 have started their new topic all about the ancient Benin Kingdom. We have used atlases to identify where it was in the past (a part of Nigeria) as well as its location today (next to Nigeria). We also explored where it fits into the timeline of both British and World History.





We have also started reading our new English text: 'Children of the Benin Kingdom. The children are thoroughly enjoying the plot line about an abandoned Edo princess. This week, we have been identifying the main characters, themes and conventions as well as exploring language features such as synonyms and antonyms.

In maths, we are coming to the end of fractions topic have been using lots of bar models to help us find fractions of an amount. Here is the method we have been using to calculate. Can you use this method to find the answer?











Attendance and punctuality



At the start of this new year a reminder please of our expectations - aligned with those of the Local Authority and the DFE -with regard to attendance and punctuality. Going to school every day is the single most important part of your child's education. Children learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind and effects their self-confidence and friendships.

Why it's Important

We all want our children to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with children coming to school each and every day. If children miss school regularly, they miss out on learning the fundamental skills that will set them up for success in the later years of school and life. There is no safe number of days for missing school – each day a pupil misses puts them behind, and can negatively affect their social skills, friendships, educational outcomes and their mental health.

Our target of 96.8%, which is in line with Government expectations. Each missed day is associated with progressively lower achievement in maths, writing and reading. Having an attendance of 90% in 1 school year equates to four whole weeks of lessons missed. Over 4 years, this means nearly 1/2 a year of lessons missed. Research suggests that 17 missed school days a year can mean one GCSE grade drop (DfE). Greater attendance = greater achievement & greater self-confidence.
